An outreach of St. Andrew Presbyterian Church

Words from Your Transitional Pastor The Rev. Eric Koenig-Reinke

Spring is a time of newness, and growth. As May has arrived, Essie and I have found ourselves busy weeding some of that new growth out of our yard at home. When I came across a certain plant I found myself wondering 'is this a weed? Or is this a plant?' I will never claim to be a horticulturist or botanist; and deciphering a weed, from a desired plant does not fall within my area of expertise. We ultimately pulled the plant, and have many more to pull. This interaction of discernment made me think about the communal discernment that we have begun as a part of the transition. Throughout any transition, and in fact within all ministry, group discernment (congregational discernment if you will) is required to answer the questions of "Who are we as the people of God? Who are our neighbors? and what is God calling us to into the future?"

Group discernment takes effort and time, and while it may not feel like much has been accomplished yet, much of the groundwork and "entering the system" tasks have been completed. I have conducted interviews with members of the session, deacons, and others. I asked two questions:

- 1. What are your hopes/dreams for the future of St. Andrew?
- 2. And 2. What are your fears/concerns/anxieties for the future of St. Andrew?

If you would like to share your answers to those questions, I would welcome your feedback! You could send in answers in writing, or even better reach out and set up a time where we could have a conversation.

The session has begun reviewing our church policies, and is thinking about the 'job descriptions' for our committees. We have named a Transitional Team, and there will be an introduction of those individuals later in this issue of Presbytidings. The Transitional Team has been meeting, and will continue to work hard over the course of the summer, and you will begin hearing more and more about how to participate in the work of congregational discernment that is required as we move forward with this task of congregational discernment. The Transitional Team is in the process of designing small group sessions, as well as recruiting and training small group leaders, and I will do my best to keep you all updated on the progress.

I also would like to note that through the month of June I will be preaching a sermon series on transitional ministry. Transitional Ministry training teaches pastors to think through 5 different focus points: *Heritage, Mission, Connections, Leadership, and Future*. Each week will include some questions for you to ponder, and discuss, as a primer for this congregational discernment.

From Eleanor Milroy:

I am a cradle to grave Scottish–Irish Presbyterian descending from generations of such, one ancestor of whom had his ear cut off for his faith and so immigrated to the U.S. The church has been a huge influence in my life both in shaping my values and faith but also in impacting my professional life as I became a faith-based organizer for several decades working with amazing people across a variety of faiths and backgrounds. I am looking forward to being a part of the transition team as I believe so strongly in the value of congregations, and especially this congregation, as a community of believers who can be in a deep enough relationship to learn from one another as we grow in our faith and all that that entails. Figuring out how best to do that in this time of transition is both challenging and exciting.

From Michael Molony:

My name is Michael Molony, a long time radio josh dickie and now an employee at APS. I started my Christian journey in a small non-denominational church where I accepted Jesus Christ as my personal Lord and Savior when I was in second grade. I spent my formative years from 4th grade through high school in an American Baptist Church, was married in a United Methodist Church... became a charter member of a PC(USA) Church here in Albuquerque, and was later on their staff for one year, and now I'm here at good ole' St. Andrew. Last year I agreed to be on Session (because no one can say "no!" to Jim Copeland) because they needed someone to fill in as an "Elder-at-Large." I have spent almost 50 years working professionally in the field of intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in 6 different states. I have had 2 family members with IDD and have been around people with IDD my entire life. My work has been and continues to be a large part of my ministry. Church and music have also been a large part of my life. That's what happens when you marry the daughter of Presbyterian missionaries whose bachelor's degree was in music therapy. Not having been a charter or long-term member of St. Andrew, I feel I have a different perspective On where St. Andrew could go. I am excited to be able to share and discuss that perspective in the ongoing review and development of St. Andrew's future.

2024 Climate Crisis - Bill Renfro

New Mexico is still in a megadrought that has lasted more than two decades and continues to increase fire danger and lower soil moisture, and current forecasts don't hold much hope for relief.

Many of you signed a letter that was sent to President Biden, our New Mexico U.S. senators and representatives and the Governor along with my state representative and state senator. The letter, which was signed by more than 80 concerned individuals, members of St. Andrew, and personnel of the Santa Fe Presbytery, was concerned with the loss of protection of certain wetlands when the U.S. Supreme Court reduced regulatory authority of the EPA under the Clean Water Act.

I have received letters from President Biden, Senator Heinrich, Representative Stansbury and a phone call from Representative Leger Fernandez. A statement from Senator Heinrich summarizes the concerns of all four: "Water is critically important to our families, farmers, wildlife, and society. Especially as we take on climate change and a drought of historic proportions, we need to find innovative ways to meet demand while conserving this precious resource. Access to clean water is central to ensuring the health and economic prosperity of New Mexico's cities, towns, villages, and pueblos." Rep. Stansbury adds: "As a native New Mexican, I know how important our waters, lands, and natural resources are, and as a science professional, I know that climate change is the single greatest threat we face."

The United States Geological Survey describes wetlands as valuable in providing habitat for thousands of species of aquatic and terrestrial plants and animals, flood protection, water quality improvement, shoreline erosion control, natural products, recreation, and aesthetics. The ability of wetland flora to filter contaminants from the water is most essential in the improvement of the quality of the groundwater and downstream water within an expansive area surrounding a wetland. Albuquerque's present water situation is so crucial that we must rely on diverting water from the San Juan Basin which is part of the Colorado River watershed. The Colorado River flow has been diminished by the megadrought of the southwest and is a crucial source for areas of California including Los Angeles County.

John Muir says that "deep within the human soul is a primal love of the earth. We don't have to create or manufacture this love Our role is simply to awaken it again and release it in one another, so that together we may serve the earth with passion." We can reduce our carbon footprint many ways, but the most powerful is: *VOTE FOR THE EARTH* this November.
