Happy Advent and Merry Christmas!

I hope in this season of beginnings, we can all work with hope into the future to which God is calling us. Much of the "transitional" work is coming to its ending, however this means the ministry of St. Andrew is beginning a new phase of life together, and will continue to begin again, day after day, and week after week, and year after year, as our God who claims us and calls us by name is continually doing a new thing.

Isaiah 43:19 (Common English Bible)

Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness.

Within the liturgy for Ash Wednesday the Book of Common Worship includes an invitation to observe a Holy Lent. In that spirit, I will invite you to observe a holy and new Advent. I am inviting you to do something new in your spiritual life and to actively engage in our Advent and Christmas Season.

Join us for a service you have never done before (or haven't done in a while). Volunteer with a new organization, help cook for our neighborhood friends, work through a devotional (be it the one we provided or another), call someone in the church you do not know well and make a new friend, and join us for our Longest Night Service on December 22nd at 4:00 PM. Make cookies for our Christmas Eve Cookie exchange that will immediately follow our Christmas Eve service of Storytelling and Song at 5:00 PM. Create a reverse Advent calendar (you can easily find examples via an internet search). Attend Adult CE, our Spiritual Formation Group, or our Historical Jesus Group. Sit somewhere new in the sanctuary on Sunday morning! Take advantage of this opportunity to begin again as you seek to refresh, renew, and grow in your own faith journey.

This advent, we are exploring "how do we being again?" I will remind you that you are a blessing, you have something to offer this congregation, and the world. So, with sincere hope you are invited to fully engage your faith this Advent season.

Why Are Poinsettias the Christmas Flower?

Native to Mexico, the plant is called *Flor de la Noche Buena* (Flower of the Holy Night) due to its resemblance to the Star of Bethlehem. According to Mexican lore, there was a young child, Pepita, who did not have a gift for the baby Jesus at a Christmas Eve service. She was very poor so all she could do was pick a bouquet of weeds to offer. The angels felt compassion for her plight. So, after Pepita set the flowers at the crèche of the nativity on Christmas Eve, the angels transformed the weeds into beautiful red flowers. Today, Poinsettias are not only the most popular Christmas plant, but the best-selling potted plant in the United States and Canada. Every Christmas Eve our sanctuary is adorned by beautiful poinsettia flowers. This tradition is part of our celebration of the arrival of the Christ Child. Another tradition is to purchase a poinsettia to remember and honor a loved one during the Christmas season. Names of loved ones will be included in our Christmas Eve bulletins. We are asking for a \$20 donation for each plant.

Session Summary


CLERK'S REPORT - November 19 Session
